

<p>Slide 1 Introduction Duration: 00:01:04</p>		<p>Notes: Hello. I'm Barry Zwiers, safety compliance officer with the Department of Labor & Industries, Division of Occupational Safety and Health. Between 2006 and 2010, nine Washington State loggers lost their lives on the job. How many of these deaths were preventable? The answer is: All of them.</p>
<p>Slide 2 How & why Duration: 00:01:04</p>		<p>Notes: A 26 year old hooktender sustained fatal injuries when he was struck by a tree that had been pushed over by the skyline. According to coworkers, at about 3:00 on a Friday afternoon, the yarder operator sent the carriage back to the 3-man rigging crew and signaled them that this would be the last turn of the day. The hooktender was using a Talkie Tooter® to control the movement of the dropline. The hooktender gave the "go ahead" signal and the turn began to move towards the carriage. That's when the turn hung-up. Co-workers said they could hear the hooktender fighting the turn and could see that the spare lift tree was being moved by the sky line. The hooktender signaled a stop and the crew watched the spare lift tree fall.</p>
<p>Slide 3 Consequences Duration: 00:00:49</p>		<p>Notes: It was 5 to 10 minutes before a worker found the hooktender lying on the side of a small, steep ravine. The crew administered CPR. EMS arrived on the scene and pronounced him deceased.</p>

<p>Slide 4 Precautions Duration: 00:01:03</p>		<p>Notes:</p> <p>Pre-work safety meetings can help prevent these types of accidents by planning the work and controlling the hazards before they happen.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ▪ All rigging crew members must be “in the clear” before giving the “go-ahead” signal on a turn. Workers are required to be to the side and behind all logs in the turn. ▪ You are not in the clear unless you are outside the swing radius of the longest log in the turn. ▪ Don’t be complacent! Beware of anything the turn could move or roll toward you and stay out of the bight of lines under tension. ▪ Watch out for one another and bring attention to any unsafe conditions you see. ▪ Don’t take chances on something you have the ability to control, it could cost you your life.
